


## MATERIALS NEEDED




# HOW TO INJECT INSULIN using a syringe



1 Wash your hands.

## 2 INJECTION AREAS




2 Remember to always rotate your injection site. Avoid injecting in scar tissues or in muscles.

## 3



3 Check the insulin bottle to make sure you have the correct type of insulin.

## 4



4 For cloudy insulin, gently roll the insulin bottle between the palms of your hands.

9 Insert the needle through the rubber top of the bottle.

## 8



8 Hold the insulin bottle firmly on a counter or tabletop.

## 7



7 Hold the syringe upright and pull the plunger back until it is at the number of units you need.

## 6



6 Pick up the syringe and remove the needle cap.

## 5



5 Wipe the top of the bottle with an alcohol swab.



10 Push the plunger down so that the air goes into the bottle.

## 11



11 Turn the bottle and syringe upside down. Draw up the correct amount of insulin.

## 12



12 Remove the syringe from the bottle.

## 13



13 Put the needle fully through the skin at a 45 degree angle, depending on the skin depth.

## 14



14 Push down the plunger with your thumb to inject the insulin.


## 15



15 Remove the needle from the skin and apply pressure to the injection site for 10 seconds.

## 16

16 Discard the syringe and needle and drop it into a sharps container.



When your sharps container is 3/4 full, bring it back to your pharmacy or your CLSC.
