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
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About the MRI exam

What is Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI)?

An MRI is an exam using magnets, radio waves and a computer to make very detailed images. This exam will not expose your child to radiation.



Your child may need to have an intravenous line (i.v.) placed in a vein for a short period of time so that we can give a contrast agent. A contrast agent is a liquid that helps us to get more information. This may be done just before or during the images.

Can my child eat and drink before the exam?



Your child cannot eat any solid food or have any liquid food or drink for 3 hours before the exam. He or she will need to fast. They also can't have any candy or gum before the exam.

Medications to take or stop taking before the exam:

If my child takes medication, can he or she take these as usual?

Yes, your child can continue to take his/her medication as usual (with sips of water). If you are unsure, please call us at: (514) 412-4400, ext. 22448.



Will my child need sedation?

This will be decided based on your child's age and ability to follow instructions. Find the age of your child to see what is usually done:



0 - 2 months old (newborn) Natural sleep for exam.



6 weeks - 4 years old Sedation for exam.



No sedation or simulator for exam.

Older than 6 yearsNo sedation for exam.

On the day of this exam:

What happens on the morning of this exam?

1. Registration

- Make sure your child has his or her valid hospital card and Medicare card. If not, go to Block C, Ground level, room RC.C0036 and ask for a new card. The administrative agent will use this card to register your child.
- Go to the medical imaging registration desk, Block B, 2nd floor, room B, 02-2018 at the time scheduled for your appointment.






2. Wait

 The administrative agent will direct you and your child to the MRI waiting area. Wait there until you are called. The waiting area is directly across the hall from the Preparation and Recovery area.

3. Prepare for the exam




- A nurse or technologist will start the preparation steps and will bring you and your child to the MRI exam room.
- The nurse or technologist will ask your child to change into a gown and remove all jewelry (including piercings), nail polish and make up.

- The nurse or the technologist will weigh your child.
- Questions will be asked about your child's health (e.g. whether your child has allergies, takes medication, has any health problems).



4. Go to the MRI suite



- When it is time for the exam, the MRI technologist will bring you to the MRI suite. You may accompany your child into this room if it is safe for you to be in a magnetic environment (the technologists will ask you some questions to be absolutely sure). You will be asked to leave all metal items outside the MRI room (e.g. cell phone, money, watch).
- Please bring your own lock to keep your personal things safe.

 Siblings will not be permitted to enter the MRI suite during the exam. Please arrange supervision for them so you can be with your child during their MRI.




During the exam:

Will my child need any special preparation before the MRI?

One of the nurses or the technologists will insert an i.v. (intravenous line) if needed. This is to inject a contrast agent. This contrast agent will help us get more information from the images.



What should you and your child expect during the exam?



You can also bring a favorite teddy bear (which has no metal on or in it) to go into the MRI machine with your child. We will then ask your child to lie on the exam table. Once your child is comfortable, the exam will start.

When the MRI is working, it makes a loud banging noise. We will give you and your child earplugs to wear, to reduce the noise. Your child can listen to music while they are being imaged and for some exams they can watch a DVD, so please bring in a CD or a DVD of your choice.




How long does the MRI take?

It usually takes 15 to 60 minutes to take all the images. During this time, your child will need to stay completely still and follow the technologist's instructions through the speaker system. Your child will be able to answer them back.



After the MRI:

What happens after the exam?



As soon as the exam is finished you can go home, or back to the ward if your child is staying in the hospital. If your child received sedation, he/she will need to stay until fully awake.

Your child can eat and drink as normal and continue his/her usual activities.




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
